City and Sanctuary Team up to Protect Corals

Key West, Oct 5

In preparation for repairing the seawall at the Key West Aquarium – damaged by Hurricane Irma – The City's environmental engineering consultant Tetra Tech this week moved several large healthy stony corals that have grown up along the seawall.

Working under a permit by the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary, biologists inventoried and removed corals for relocating to the sanctuary's coral nursery nearby in Truman Harbor. Once the coral colonies are safely out of harm's



way, restoration of the damaged waterfront area will continue.

Coral nursery manager Erich Bartels of CBE Marine will care for the corals until they can be used to support critical restoration or research projects. ■

Key West's Harpoon Harry's leads the way into recycling future

Sometimes people have to be dragged kicking and screaming into the future. But at Harpoon Harry's, the popular 26-year-old restaurant at 832 Caroline St., turning to recycling was a no-brainer.

Ron Heck, Harry's owner and manager, was approached by Waste Management, the city's contracted trash hauler, two years ago and asked whether he wanted to participate in a pilot program to recycle as much



of the restaurant's material as possible. Harry's gets two deliveries a day, including eight trucks worth of food products each week. That adds up to a lot of cardboard delivery boxes, metal cans, glass liquor bottles; all material that because Key West does not require mandatory business recycling, was going straight into the trash. Heck was initially concerned, wondering how hard it would be to train his staff to separate recyclable material from trash and begin putting it into designated bins. Other business owners also worry about the cost

City hammers out new lease for Garrison Bight liveaboards

Negotiations had been on-going for several months, as dozens of the boat and floating home owners had objected to the initial proposed lease

Key West residents living on their boats in Garrison Bight came away half-satisfied recently when city commissioners approved a new lease for the liveaboards.

Negotiations had been on-going for several months, as dozens of the boat and floating home owners had objected to the initial proposed lease, the first new dockage agreement since 2003. City Manager Jim Scholl delayed implementing the new lease for four months, giving marina officials and boat residents time to hash out compromises on several of the issues. But there were two last, significant items where city staff and the liveaboards could not agree. One would require liveaboards

at Garrison Bight to have a marine survey of their boat or floating home every five years. The other was a \$1 per foot assessment for capital improvement and capital maintenance projects, a move that would raise an additional \$54,000 a year.

Robert and Marylou Lane, the unofficial spokes-couple for Bight liveaboards, argued that the \$1/foot increase was not designated for specific marina improvement projects. Instead it would go into the Bight operational fund for unnamed future use. Robert Lane said that a portion of the approximately \$450,000 collected in rent from liveaboards that is normally supposed to go towards capital maintenance projects has often gone unspent in past years.

to recycle and whether adding recycling bins to commercial trash areas would require more space in a severely space-constrained town.

But Heck was more than pleasantly surprised. First of all, he said it took his staff about two days to work out the process to separate recyclables. Each staff member disposes of recyclables into designated 55-gallon plastic bins. Two staff members are tasked with regularly emptying those bins into a larger recycling area. But the number of bins has remained the same, Heck said. Before recycling, Harpoon Harry's used six 55-gallon trash bins a day. Today, that count remains at six, only four of them are for recycling and two for trash.

"And sometimes we don't even fill up one," he said about the two remaining trash bins, which are used primarily for food scraps.

As for the cost, Heck used to pay Waste Management about \$650 a month for trash pick-up. His bill is now \$350 a month because it costs Waste

Management less to haul recyclable material than trash. Trash is normally taken to a burn disposal facility which charges haulers by weight to handle the material. Recyclables go to a different facility where it costs less per pound because the material can be sold to manufacturers and reused.

"Our recycle bill is a fraction of our trash bill," Heck said. "We're saving \$300 a month easily. That's over \$3,000 a year."

Plus, it's just the right thing to do, helping the ecologically-sensitive Florida Keys. Heck said 10-12 percent of Harpoon Harry's business is take-out. Today, those meals are put into non-recyclable Styrofoam with equally non-recyclable plastic utensils. But Heck said that starting around Dec. 1, he is switching to cardboard takeout containers and wooden utensils that are stronger but cost the same as plastic.

"We're ready to switch over," he said. "We've been on this corner for 26 years. We're really excited about the changes." ■

“We do not need another burden put on the boats at approximately \$1 a foot or \$42 a month for monies you already have,” he said.

“I want to remind you at Garrison Bight we are a prime example of an affordable lifestyle,” Marylou Lane said, referring to the city’s intensified efforts lately to create more affordable housing. Of the 243 boat slips at the Bight marina, 109 are rented to people who live on their vessels.

Commissioner Sam Kaufman, who represents the district where Garrison Bight is located, said that the just-approved fiscal 2019 city budget does not include a line item for how the extra \$54,000 raised by the assessment would be used.

“If you remember from the July workshop on the budget, there is no inclusion of a dollar per foot in our budget. There is no identified expenditures for that one dollar per foot,” he told his fellow commissioners.

But Doug Bradshaw, Key West Director of Port and Marine Services, argued that the \$1 per foot assessment is badly needed. While there may not be a specific project identified for the new revenue, the Bight’s reserve fund is hovering around zero because of expenses related to cleaning up after Hurricane Irma last year. The Bight and next-door charter boat row, both city-owned properties, sustained extensive damage to the docks, walkways and railings.

While fees at Garrison Bight bring in between \$400,000 and \$450,000 a year, Bradshaw said, repair and maintenance projects often cost millions of dollars.

“We struggle each year to come up with sufficient revenue to cover all our projects, all our expenses, as well as build up reserves,” he said.

“When you’re looking at a million, a million and a half project, you do the math. It takes a while to build up that fund.”

Commissioners opted for a compromise, voting to delay the \$1 a foot increase for a year. While the Bight residents in the audience grumbled, they accepted the compromise and the extra year they now have to prepare for the expense.

But commissioners sided with marina officials on the second unsolved issue requiring a marine survey every five years. The survey would examine the outside of a boat or floating home to ensure the integrity of the hull and identify other issues that might cause the vessel to sink at its dock. The survey is needed to help the city protect its property, Bradshaw said, adding that it would cost between \$350 and \$800 depending on the size and condition of the vessel.

“A lot of these vessels are old,” he pointed out.

Marylou Lane argued that even an up-to-date marine survey would not have prevented the sinking of 11 floating homes docked in the Bight during Hurricane Irma. A survey can’t stop a sinking, just like an inspection can’t stop a roof ripping off in hurricane-force winds, she said.

But Mayor Craig Cates, an avid boater himself, said that requiring a survey every five years shouldn’t impose too harsh a financial burden on the marine residents. The survey will not look at a vessel’s engines or electrical systems that more take time and money to access. The survey is basically to ensure the integrity of a boat or floating home’s hull, he said, adding that the insurance policy he has on his recreational boat requires a hull inspection every year. ■

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TSIC Program Offers Opportunity

Education is the most important part of childhood. It carves the path for the future and helps people to understand and navigate their adult lives. College introduces students to the adult world while still allowing them the help of teachers and administrators.

College is even more accessible than ever for students at Key West High School (KWHs) because of Take Stock in Children (TSIC) “a non-profit scholarship program, providing college scholarships to low income, academically qualified students,” says Carrie Jo Howe, a TSIC mentor.

Lindsay Moore, the College Success Coach at KWHs in charge of TSIC explains that she has “conversations with students about their goals” where she reviews their academic history and discusses career choices. Moore hopes to enable

students to earn grades that are reflective of their vocational goals.

Moore explains the span of this program, “We are currently overseeing [more than] 115

[students], and we are about to exceed 300 from Monroe County.”

Not only does the program help students, it also involves adults. Each of the students are paired with a mentor. Howe explains these relationships, “I’m in a unique position. I’m not her mom or her teacher. I’m her supporter and cheerleader.”

Howe describes the routine of a normal meeting, “We meet once a week for 40 minutes during the school year. We talk about everything from fashion and friends to the challenges of high school. Since [my student] is a junior this year, we will be having a lot of scholarship and college preparation conversations.”

As well as having regular mentor meetings, students who participate in TSIC need to follow certain academic and economic requirements. Moore explains that their GPA needs to be a 2.5 or higher with a passing Florida Standard Assessment score.

Once they have adhered to the requirements, students can reap the benefits of TSIC, as Moore points out, “Our goal is to prepare students for college... with hopes of connecting them with a mentor and reaching their goals. Then by providing them [with] a scholarship the hope is [for them] to graduate debt free.”

He admitted that he placed his personal cell phone in the paper dispenser to record certain female subjects whom he found attractive.

Upper Keys, Oct 10

A 33-year-old Tavernier store clerk was arrested Tuesday night following an investigation after a teenager found a cell phone in a gas station restroom.

Alex Joel Rodriguez was charged with video voyeurism.

The investigation began on Oct. 7 after Sheriff's Office Deputy Kyle Page was called to the reporting teen's house about 1:20 a.m. The teen was with her parents when she told Deputy Page that she had been with friends earlier. She stated they stopped at the Circle K, 92720 Overseas Highway, Tavernier at Mile Marker 92. The teen stated she went inside the ladies' restroom where she washed her hands. She added that she did not disrobe and that she only went to the restroom to wash her hands. The teen retrieved some toilet paper from the dispenser. A cell phone fell out of the dispenser and onto the floor.

The teen took it to the clerk thinking someone may have left it on accident. The teen told Deputy Page that the clerk, later identified as Rodriguez, took the phone abruptly. The teen described the clerk's behavior as "strange" and "sketchy" when she gave him the phone. Sgt. Orlando Alvarez and Deputies Jamie Miller and Joel Torres went to the Circle K where they found Rodriguez. Deputy Page, the teen and her parents sent to the Circle K. The teen identified Rodriguez as the clerk. She identified the phone he had as the phone she found in the restroom.

Deputies questioned Rodriguez. His story changed several times. He stated it was his phone. He then stated it wasn't his phone. He stated it wasn't his phone, but his phone looked similar. He stated he gave the phone that was turned in by the teen to a woman who had claimed it, but he couldn't provide details of the exchange. Deputy Miller went to the ladies' restroom while it was vacant and noted that his cell phone fit in the paper dispenser and was able to record video of much of the room. The cell phone in question was taken into evidence. Detective Edward Askins was assigned to investigate further.

A review of security footage showed Rodriguez entering the ladies' restroom on the day in question with the phone and exiting without it.

Rodriguez was questioned by Detective Edward Askins on Tuesday. Rodriguez admitted to entering the ladies' restroom on the day in question. He admitted that he placed his personal cell phone in the paper dispenser to record certain female subjects whom he found attractive. Rodriguez stated he would notice them outside first and place his phone in the restroom prior to their entry to the store. Rodriguez stated he had been recording female patrons for several weeks in the hopes that they "would take their clothes off." Rodriguez stated he only recorded the ladies' restroom and not the men's. Rodriguez stated he would erase the content from his phone after viewing it.

Rodriguez was taken to jail. ■

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



Notes from a Key West Crash-Site

For many, Key West is a place of utopia, of holiday escape. A bijou-dot on the map with Peter Pan mystique. But for me, a resident of 45 years, it is home. A place of fickle changeability. Key West is at once comical, dramatic, and even predictable at times in its tropical uniformity—as ordinary as a postcard depending on my mood.

As a person in a wheelchair, I am sometimes a victim of its laid-back and sleepy access, its tilted sidewalks, its uprooted trees and overgrown vegetation. Various walkways have grown askew like my own slanted body and I have become accustomed to this eccentric island city as well as my leaning physique. But suddenly, I felt separate, apart, disembodied. Almost a visitor. This evolution of odd- feeling, of adaptation through separation, became known to me when I experienced a car accident in 2003.

I have always thought that the vehicle, a silver SUV, had it in for me. My Mom and I had previously experienced a frightening loss of control with the car on a Daytona highway. From that moment on, the car possessed no personality. Like most messengers of death, it was merely a silver capsule, detached and clean like a Tylenol. Or an obscure lunar suppository falling from space.

Perhaps it was fate.

I recall the moment of impact as a solid crunch, mimicking the bright lights and purple tones of “Mulholland Drive,” the David Lynch film that I had just seen. A great column of cement hung in front of me—a single tower. I didn’t feel anything. My mouth hit something. My leg hit something. I was crying and I wanted to crawl out of my body. To be nothing. I was taken to the hospital. Bright lights. A long wait. A hurried doctor. A viewing machine against my ankle. Pain.

They gave me an injection of Demerol. The injection of liquid clouds gave me peace.

Back at home, my house seemed made of cardboard. An envelope made for my body of paper. I was put on Cyclobenzaprine, a muscle relaxant. I grew in fear of my right leg as a terrorist and conspirator for pain. Panic-making headaches pierced me in bright beams of light. In restaurants, the very same beams of light stalked me as people smiled into their digital cameras. When they snapped the pictures, it seemed as if their souls were being collected in those tiny stainless steel boxes. Perhaps the pain lifted the veil of appearances, making everyone appear blind, hysterical, uncomprehending. My foot resembled a sausage, a tight balloon-like mass of green and blue veins.

My Mom kept saying she was worried about me. I would say nothing. I went with my Dad for iced tea but I only stared at the creaseless tropical sky as voices sang around me like so much insectile gibberish.

In the purple-blue of night with my foot like an ache on a stick, I dreamed of Campari, the beautiful red color that is the envy of all reds, the essence of all ruby and the core of all scarlet. The dream proved itself to be the red of all time and I drank hungrily. My leg was jealous, angry, wanting attention. Sometimes the pain was less with the light on. Perhaps the pain was a messenger of night. I waited for the pain to pass and when it did, I felt like an emperor in scarlet robes.

I saw my body as strange calligraphy, a squiggle in the darkness—deep red, purple. Phosphorescent. I traveled much in the time of sleeping, riding on Garcia Lorca’s great dark eyebrows that were poised like a Spanish Galleon.

Even though I looked forward to my dreams with envy, night loomed

before me, huge and intimidating. A cobalt black sea. The night became a map of time, seemingly endless. My body resembled a halting rickshaw, a skinny slow compass, trying to mark its passage, to make it across.

In between the flashes of pain, I saw the phantom-light towers of the Trade Center on television. They appeared Gothic and glorious, something out of Dick Tracy or Batman. I started to cry, but I didn’t see the ghostly towers as sad. Instead, they were spiritual exclamation-points of survival, even calls to action and awareness. I saw them also as memorials of American milk, symbolizing the milk that I could no longer enjoy, being self-diagnosed with lactose intolerance shortly after Sept. 11th. A condition which seemed to climax during the accident.

Often when I was interrupted in sleep, my leg transformed into a big painful number 1. A single column. The side of a building that refused to move aside. Like most reporters have said when they speak of 9-11, for me there was “a new normal.” Now there was a new Ian. I was a germ of a man and my painful sensations in the leg and stomach were mixed with images of the Twin Towers under attack.

I looked quizzically at the passing tourists, much like the Bruce Willis character in “12 Monkeys.” Nothing was making much sense to me. I had trouble finding a Key West that I felt comfortable in. Cruise ships and ice cream floats manned by curious star-like extremities would pass me by, but it all seemed like so much cardboard. I was missing out on the particular version of Key West that most were seeing. I didn’t have the right set of instructions. I was evolving into an alien observer with a new revolting stomach and a huge swollen foot. I was a Doomsday man. Adult sounds—the noise of motorcycles and mopeds—intimidated me, along with the gruff hammer-like

speech of a carpenter’s profanity. I was Outside. Except I wasn’t sure where Outside was supposed to be. Common English seemed to resemble the language of the palmetto bug, an insect once native to Key West. I myself with my spastic hands and jittery posture, became cousin to the cricket. I assumed the role of a listener to worlds microscopic.

An ant appeared on my pillow. Two red ants were moving a piece of paper across my pillow with great effort. The paper happened to be shaped like the numeral “1.” I thought that the shred of paper resembled my foot. The ants in their struggle and determination appeared like firemen clearing away the rubble of the Twin Towers, lifting the piece of paper high in the air like a jagged sword with unceasing teamwork.

In this way I discovered that humans share a nobility with the ants. See the how the ants with red helmets raised are holding their burden high, holding their burden high aloft! Raising their burden high in defiance of all!

My right leg is now long healed, yet I am still left with an odd sense of myself. My body-image is of three types: one, that of light, dancing under a skeleton. Second, a skeleton under a crushing and painful weight. And finally, my body as a hard inflexible nautilus shell, filled with scorching liquid, stuffed and bloated, only to be lifted by a crane that is clumsy and lopsided.

This vision persists today as I look out on the sun, feeling no pain at all, no phantom aches. I look at my friend Roman and his perpetually smiling face of wonder. Then I see the bodies of dismembered ants around my bed, torn, like the rusted husks of fallen spacecraft. I have failed to recover their last messages. I need to get back home. ■

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■ Rescue Tails

Jack the Pirate

In February, our Marathon Campus had its largest intake of animals at one time. 40 cats were rescued from horrific conditions in a hoarding situation. On a very hot day, huge dog kennels containing as many as seven or more cats were unloaded from the back of two pickup trucks. Each cat was suffering in some way: caked feces and urine in their coats, scratches, ear infections, fleas, and three were even missing eyes. A little orange tabby, later named Jack, was one of those three.

The shelter closed for an entire day to process each cat. Thanks to local veterinarian, Dr. Maddox, and professional groomer Sophia Pierce, along with staff and a handful of volunteers, each cat was tested for communicable diseases, vaccinated, de-wormed, microchipped, photographed, bathed and medically evaluated. For twelve hours straight, and at a cost of over \$5,000, each cat was finally given the medical care it needed. For some of the traumatized cats, it would take months for them to finally feel safe and loved. As it turned out, Jack came into our shelter at just the right time.

With only one eye, and being particularly shy, our volunteers showered him with extra love and attention. Having captured the heart of one volunteer in particular, Jen made it her daily goal to give Jack one-on-one play time and affection.



One afternoon she noticed a very small, seemingly trivial black dot on his eye and some minor cloudiness. In any normal situation this would be easily missed by even the most astute owner. Considering little Jack had just the one eye, he was seen by the veterinarian and shockingly diagnosed with a rare and mysterious eye disease called corneal sequestrum. Without swift medical intervention Jack the Pirate could quickly go blind. He needed surgery by a specialist, and he needed it now!

Dr. Dylan Buss of the Animal Eye

Clinic in Deerfield Beach heard our call for help and offered to evaluate and perform the delicate surgery. Volunteers took the four-hour drive to get there and in August he had his surgery. While Dr. Buss generously discounted her fee, the procedure cost \$1,000, a large sum for a small animal shelter.* So far, the surgery has been successful but with the possibility of re-occurrence in the future, what this little pirate cat needs now is a home with a special family that understands and accepts his special needs. Jack may not be

adopted just yet, but most certainly, he was rescued.

*To help animals with medical needs we established Oscar's Fund, solely dedicated to help pay veterinary costs for animals like Jack.

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

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The Iconic A&B Lobster House Sold to Local Key West Group

One of Key West's most iconic brands has changed ownership. A&B Lobster House and the adjoining businesses along the Key West Historic Seaport were recently sold to the Smith family of Key West, along with investors behind the revitalized Stock Island Marina Village.

The purchase included A&B Lobster House, Berlin's Cigar & Cocktail Bar, Alonzo's Oyster Bar, White Tarpon Bar, a forty-five slip marina, several retail spaces and the 70 space parking lot at 700 Front Street. The buildings that house The Commodore Waterfront Restaurant and The Boathouse Bar & Grill were also packaged in the purchase.

The new ownership consists of the Smith family, which notably consists of local Key West attorney Barton Smith, Key West Resort Utilities and the Key West Golf Club—along with

investors associated with Stock Island Marina Village. The project is being managed by The Red Pants Collection, which evolved out of the Stock Island Marina team.

Mike Hartman, President of the Red Pants Collection, said the group's decision to purchase the historic property was largely based on a vision of expansion, while preserving the almost quarter century of local nostalgia and traditions developed by former owners Gene and Will Smith.

"We want to build upon the recognized successes of Gene and Will," said Hartman. "We understand this location is very much a part of the history of Key West. But it is also instrumental to the future of Key West, especially relating to local jobs, tourism growth and local business development. And most of all, we want to revitalize the local vibe along the Key West Harbor." ■






